<u>Important Information Regarding Student Medical</u> Conditions

In February 2018, the Ministry of Education updated policies related to students in schools who have **one or more** of the following medical conditions:

- Anaphylaxis; and/or
- Asthma; and/or
- Diabetes; and/or
- Epilepsy; and/or
- Life Threatening Medical Conditions

If your child has a medical condition, please contact the school prior to September 6, 2022 to co-create a Plan of Care for your child. New plans of care are required at the start of each school year as student needs may have changed. Of note, the responsibilities of parents/guardians of children with prevalent medical conditions include:

As primary caregivers of their child, parents/guardians are expected to be active participants in supporting the management of their child's medical condition(s) while the child is in school.

At a minimum, parents/guardians should:

- educate their child about their medical condition(s) with support from their child's health care professional, as needed
- guide and encourage their child to reach their full potential for self-management and self- advocacy
- inform the school of their child's medical condition(s) and co-create the Plan of Care for their child with the principal or the principal's designate
- communicate changes to the Plan of Care, such as changes to the status of their child's medical condition(s) or changes to their child's ability to manage the medical condition(s), to the principal or the principal's designate
- confirm annually to the principal or the principal's designate that their child's medical status is unchanged



- initiate and participate in annual meetings to review their child's Plan of Care
- supply their child and/or the school with sufficient quantities of medication and supplies in their original, clearly labelled containers, as directed by a health care professional and as outlined in the Plan of Care, and track the expiration dates if they are supplied
- seek medical advice from a medical doctor, nurse practitioner, or pharmacist, where appropriate.
- *These forms are sent electronically to all parents/guardians but should only be completed for those students who have LIFE THREATENING medical conditions.

STEO Walk Zone

Student Transportation of Eastern Ontario (STEO) along with the Upper Canada District School Board (UCDSB) would like to remind you that the transportation policy currently identifies the following (maximum) distances for students to walk to school:

Grade Maximum Walking Distance to School

JK – Grade 3	0.8 kms
Grades 4 – 6	1.6 kms
Grades 7 – 12	2.0 kms

As a result of grade transition or relocation, your child(ren) may reside within the "walk zone" to their home school for the upcoming 2022-2023 school year. Parents of students within the walk zone are responsible to arrange supervision for their children's walk to school if necessary.
